




YEAR OF PRAYER

have to admit something. Since I took over as Fr. Joseph, MIC, in January, I have been occupied with prayer. Now, on one level, that should come as no surprise. After all I am a religious priest and prayer is a control part of many surprise. After all, I am a religious priest and prayer is a central part of my daily life. So I should be preoccupied with it. That is true. However, it seems that since I arrived on Eden Hill, God has been emphasizing prayer to me both personally and ministerially in a different and renewing way.

Let me briefly explain. Shortly after I began working in the role of Fr. Joseph, I was asked to lead a live praying of the <u>Chaplet of Divine Mercy</u> on our Instagram page (@thedivinemercy). That ultimately inspired me to lead a 54-day Divine Mercy Chaplet Novena from Ash Wednesday through Divine Mercy Sunday.

After that, I decided to continue the live praying of the Chaplet on Fridays. Now, beginning June 7, a First Friday as well as the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, we will dedicate the Friday Chaplet to praying specifically for the dying, on Instagram as well as Facebook (@DivineMercyOfficial) and on DivineMercyPlus.org.

The simple motivation in all of this is that I felt the Lord just wanting me to shepherd His people by praying with them.

But as I previously mentioned, it wasn't just in the area of ministry where prayer was given more of a focus. Rather, it has been in my personal life as well. Back in March I felt the Lord moving me to renew the quality of my own prayer. So I began to once again read *The Ways of* Mental Prayer by Fr. Vital Lehodey. It's an excellent book on prayer that I discovered a few years ago when it came highly recommended by Fr. Chad Ripperger during one of his YouTube talks.

Why do I share all of this with you? Well, what the

Lord has been emphasizing in my life and ministry since January made even more sense to me when I was reminded recently that Pope Francis dedicated 2024 to be a "Year of Prayer," to prepare the Church for the celebration

of the upcoming Jubilee Year of

Hope in 2025.

How providential that in this time of Eucharistic revival in the United States, the Universal Church summons us all to focus on prayer! For if we consider that the Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that "the life of prayer is the habit of being in the presence of the thrice-holy God and in communion with Him" (2565), then we can truly value how the Year of Prayer perfectly coincides with the revival. The Eucharist is central to the life of faith and prayer in the Church. It is where we can be in the presence of God in a substantial manner and have a real communion with Him, especially when we participate in the Mass.

So even though we are halfway through the calendar year, let us recognize that we still have six months to take advantage of the graces the Holy Spirit is offering to us during this Year of Prayer for the upcoming Jubilee.

My question to you, then, is this: Will you join me and my Marian brethren in the Year of Prayer? Will you open your hearts to the Holy Spirit and allow your whole life to become a prayer to God? Will you also renew your sense of awe and wonder in Jesus' true presence in the Holy Eucharist?

Think about the fire that God wants to set ablaze in our hearts. Please join me in this call to faith, in this call to prayer, in this call to transformation, in this call to holiness.

efore Fr. Chris Alar, MIC, spoke at the parish of St. Robert Bellarmine in Blue Springs, Missouri, in June 2023, the parishioners had heard of the <u>Divine</u> Mercy Chaplet. Their current pastor had come to them in October 2019 from Our Lady of Good Counsel, the diocesan Shrine of Divine Mercy and St. Faustina in Kansas City, Missouri.

As a seminarian assigned to St. Luke's Hospital in Kansas City in 2000, Richard Rocha had attended daily Mass at Our Lady of Good Counsel, where the pastor prayed the Divine Mercy Chaplet with his congregation after every Mass.

Seventeen years later, Fr. Rocha became the pastor there, continuing what his predecessor had begun.

Understanding Divine Mercy

Father Rocha introduced the tradition of praying the Chaplet after Mass. While some parishioners faithfully remained in the pews to pray, not many knew much about the message Our Lord had given to St. Faustina and the wealth of graces that can be obtained through the devotion.

After Fr. Chris' visit, that began to change.

During his talk on "The Four Last Things" (Death, Judgment, Heaven, Hell), Fr. Chris' Marian Press books were available for sale, including *Understanding Divine* Mercy. Frank and Ruth Hays were among the attendees who acquired a copy, as was their friend John Milosevich. "Those of us who bought it and read it found ourselves rereading it," says Frank.

John had already read St. Faustina's diary, *Divine Mercy in My Soul*, but after reading *Understanding Divine Mercy*, he realized he had "only scratched the surface" of learning about the message and devotion.

"The *Diary* is not an easy read, compared to Fr. Chris'

book, which is very conversational and easy to digest," he admits.

The three approached their pastor about finding a way to get the book into the hands of as many other parishioners as possible. "I was open to the fact that they wanted to do this," says Fr. Rocha. He recommended that they speak to Deacons Robert Falke and Joseph Zagar, who suggested building a Lenten mission around it.

Understanding Divine Mercy is divided into five chapters, and there are five full weeks in Lent. Five weekly sessions would help the parish prepare for the celebration of Easter, especially for the Second Sunday of Easter, the Feast of Divine Mercy. The mission team hoped that when the mission was concluded, attendees would participate in the parish traditions of praying the Divine Mercy Novena together, beginning on Good Friday, and observing the Feast of

Mercy so as to gain the indulgence and special graces attached to it.

Book copies

To spread the word about the mission and to propagate the Divine Mercy message among those who would not attend, the mission team decided to order 500 copies of *Understanding Divine Mercy.* The parish women's and men's ministries and chapters of Knights of Columbus and the Catholic men's group "That Man is You" agreed to provide the funds.


Peter Markavage at the Marian Helpers Center helped the

team order the large quantity of books they needed at the best possible price. He also provided them with a playlist of Fr. Chris' videos to use at their sessions.

When the books arrived, the mission team prepared them for distribution, with a flier advertising the mission tucked inside each copy. On Ash Wednesday, 450 copies were given away, and the remaining 50, on the first Sunday of Lent. The team

promptly ordered 100 more copies and quickly distributed them as well.

At the first session of the mission, nearly all of the participants reported having read at least the first chapter of *Understanding Divine Mercy*. Many had already finished the book. Over the five weekly sessions, in-person attendance averaged 130 people; the videos had more than 300 views on Facebook and YouTube as of this writing.

"Not bad for a small parish like ours," says Frank.

The mission team offered social time after the final session, expecting 20-30 people to stay. Almost 100 did.

"Everyone was anxious to share their thoughts, conversions, and Aha! moments," Frank reports.

Not just praying

"The first word of the book title is key," says Ruth. "Understanding, not just praying, this devotion."

After the mission, Fr. Rocha noticed more people than usual remaining in the pews to pray the Novena of Chaplets in preparation for the Feast of Mercy. Frank had hoped for this outcome, believing that "if people knew the opportunity and the graces they were walking away from, they would give those extra seven minutes."

Some mission participants shared their gratitude and insights with the team in written comments. Nathan Eckenberg wrote, "I'm blown away. I had absolutely no idea the significance and power of Divine Mercy Sunday. Unbelievable — what a gift!"

Susanna Daley learned, "Praying the Divine Mercy Chaplet will save more and more souls beside ourselves. I have made it my mission to pray the Chaplet daily at 3 p.m."

Lines for Confession

On the Feast of Mercy, three priests heard confessions at St. Robert Bellarmine, beginning at 2 p.m. Lines of people

waited for the Sacrament up to and even during the celebration that began at 3 p.m., the Hour of Mercy, and included the blessing of the **Divine** Mercy Image, the singing of the Chaplet, and Eucharistic Adoration.

"The Holy Spirit is working in our parish right now," says Ruth. "We feel very honored and blessed to be a part of it."

And the work has begun to extend

its reach. Frank has been contacted by several nearby parishes interested in holding their own Divine Mercy mission next Lent.

"I had no idea what <u>Divine Mercy</u> was," wrote attendee Candy Mitchell, "and think more people should hear this








DEFEND US IN BATTLE: THE PROMISES OF ST. MICHAEL AND THE HEAVENLY ANGELS


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

CALLED TO SERVE

he Marians arrived in Cameroon, on the western coast of Africa, 25 years ago. Today, 10 priests serve in three communities: Atok, Minkama, and Ngoya. Communities of Divine Mercy seek to set people free from fear and poverty, proclaiming hope and the promise of a dignified way of life.

Father Rogatien Ntsana, MIC, a Marian priest from Cameroon, is currently studying in Rome. He was ordained five years ago. Let's get to know him in his own words.

"I was born into a strongly Christian family, the son of the late Daniel Ze and Lucie Bouan, the second child in a family of seven. I come from St. Joseph de Mbegue parish in the Diocese of Doume-Abong-Mbang.


"My grandfather, Antoine Ntsana, was a catechist in the Christian community, and my grandmother Sophie Minkos helped him in this service. It was in this climate of daily prayer that I grew up. My father was also a catechist. As for my mother, it was thanks to her that I discovered and came to love the beauty of liturgical chant. Today, her commitment is very limited because she became blind 13 years ago at the age of 47.

"As for my Marian vocation, in 2006 I met Fr. Francis Filipiec, MIC, who founded the Marian mission in Cameroon. I was touched by the charism. I started monthly meetings in 2007 and, in 2010, I began postulancy.

"On Aug. 3, 2019, at the Shrine of Divine Mercy in Atok, I received the Sacrament of Holy Orders, recalling the words of Scripture, 'Do not be afraid, for I have redeemed you, I have called you by name, you are mine' (Is 43:1).

"Our mission in Cameroon comprises three communities: the parish and shrine of the Divine Mercy in Atok in the Diocese of Obala; the parish of St. John Paul II in Minkama; and the Bl. George Matulewicz House of Formation, for novices and seminarians.

"In our parishes, we imbue our charism with a variety of pastoral activities, including services for the faithful and, above all, sharing our Marian spirituality with the younger



"As youth chaplains, we had a slogan, 'He lives and He wants you to live.' We took part in diocesan pilgrimages with the young people and children, composing songs in line with the theme of the pilgrimage. I also did two years of family ministry.

"I then became the postulant moderator and spiritual father of the confrères still in forma-

tion at Ngoya. This was an important moment of taking the future of our Congregation to heart, and thus assuming greater responsibility.

"Now I'm in Rome, a very rich experience with community life in all its diversity and the opportunity to visit the Eternal City and the historic sites that have left their mark on the Catholic faith. I'm currently studying Pastoral Theology at the Pontifical Salesian University, specializing in youth ministry. These studies will be a great help to my spiritual and human growth. In our mission in Cameroon, it will be an instrument for the New Evangelization, and for vocational pastoral care (welcoming, listening, and accompanying). I am also learning how to share the Bible with parishioners.

"I never cease to express my gratitude to my superiors for this opportunity which allows me to feel the heartbeat of our Congregation and the universal Church. Clearly, this multifaceted renewal allows us to move forward for Christ and the Church."

"I saw a little girl talking to an officer, and called him 'Father,'" he recalled. "And he called her 'my angel.' I asked if they are related. And this offi cer said, 'No. She's not my daughter, but I'm taking care of her.' And he added, 'My own child is serving somewhere. And I hope somebody will take care of him as I am of this little girl." Father expressed his gratitude for donations and prayers. 'The world becomes more warm'

ot even an April snowfall, an East Coast earthquake, or cold blustery weather could deter 15,000 faithful from making the journey to Eden Hill for the celebration of Divine Mercy Weekend, April 6-7 at the National Shrine of The Divine Mercy in Stockbridge, Massachusetts.

"We're in the middle of four beautiful days!" proclaimed the Very Rev. Chris Alar, MIC, provincial superior, during the live EWTN pre-show on April 7 with the Most Rev. Joe Roesch, MIC, superior general. "We had First Friday and First Saturday. Today is Divine Mercy Sunday. And tomorrow is the Solemnity of the Annunciation — and an eclipse! What a blessing!"

Pilgrims arriving on Saturday were treated to the annual Mercy Weekend Conference. This year's speakers, under the theme "Godly Fathers Strengthen Families," were Marian vocation director and author Fr. Donald Calloway, MIC, and Jim Wahlberg, producer of the new documentary Jesus *Thirsts: The Miracle of the Eucharist* (in theaters June 4-6).

Tent city

Throughout the weekend, the 350-acre Shrine grounds were transformed into a tent city, providing opportunities for Confession, Eucharistic Adoration, praying the Rosary, and perusing the Divine Mercy Gift Shop. A dedicated team of Marian priests, brothers and seminarians, lay employees, and volunteers — 500 in total — provided a safe and serene atmosphere for pilgrims eager to obtain the extraordinary graces promised on this feast.

Masses were celebrated outdoors at the Mother of Mercy Outdoor Shrine. The celebrant of the Vigil Mass was

Fr. Matthew Tomeny, MIC, National Shrine rector, and on Divine Mercy Sunday, His Excellency, the Most Rev. Timothy P. Broglio, JCD, Archbishop of the Archdiocese for the Military Services, U.S.A., and president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Next year, Fr. Tomeny will join the archdiocese as a Navy chaplain.

The Divine Mercy Sunday Liturgy was broadcast live on EWTN. The lively and informative hour-long pre-show discussed the Eucharist and Spiritual Fatherhood with five guests: Archbishop Broglio, Fr. Calloway, Wahlberg, former NFL quarterback and inspirational speaker Elvis Grbac, and NFL assistant coach Ben Steele.

Warm light

Despite the cold, the atmosphere atop Eden Hill was joyous (as shown on the following pages), and pilgrims departed for destinations as far away as California and Canada with renewed faith and hope in the promise of God's loving mercy.

"Through the divine fire that pours forth from the side of Christ, the rays of Divine Mercy that represent the Blood and Water by which we are washed clean of our sins and sanctified, Jesus opens every locked door and sets all captives free," said Fr. Andy Davy, MIC, in his homily for the Vigil Mass. "As the missionaries of mercy go forth, the world becomes more warm and more filled with mercy, and you become a light. You become an extension of that bridge of the rays of Divine Mercy."





THE GIFT OF **FORGIVENESS**

The Most Reverend Timothy P. Broglio, JCD, was the celebrant of the <u>Divine Mercy Sunday</u> Liturgy on April 7 at the National Shrine of The Divine Mercy. Archbishop Broglio oversees the Archdiocese for the Military Services, U.S.A., and is the president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Here is an excerpt from his homily.

athered in this National Shrine, we recall that Divine Mercy is without a doubt directly related to the sacrifice of Jesus Christ, which gives meaning to all sacrifice. Suffering has meaning inasmuch as it allows us to be in communion with the Lord who suffered for us.

We begin to understand the depth of His love. Divine Mercy flows forth from the wounded side of Christ in the moment of His glorification, as St. John portrays the Passion, Death, and Resurrection as an inseparable, unique moment.

Forgiveness is the first Easter gift. The power and the

responsibility to forgive repentant sinners is clearly given to the Apostles on that Easter Sunday night. It flows from the very breath of our Divine Savior.

Mercy everywhere

Pope Francis is known for his desire to make certain that the effects of Divine Mercy are experienced everywhere, especially on the peripheries. Even the motto of his pontificate, Miserando atque eligendo ("By having mercy, and by choosing him"), emphasizes this imitation of Divine Mercy. He will be remembered for his impetus to bring the message of salvation to every person, and leave no stone unturned in his quest to invite all to experience the Merciful Lord. ...

Saint Faustina left priests a mission to proclaim the mercy

of God to all, as she says, quoting the Lord Jesus: "Let the sinner not be afraid to approach Me. The flames of mercy are burning Me — clamoring to be spent; I want to pour them out upon [all] these **souls**" (Diary of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, 50). ...

We can change

The mission is to go forward from this celebration with the challenge to build up our human

communities to reflect more precisely our origin and call. The incivility, anger, back-biting, and me worship that so often characterize our world need not be the rule. They can change, if we change. ... Remember the mafia victim Bl. Rosario Livatino's statement: "When I die no one will ask me how much I believed, but rather how credible I was."

We remember those four characteristics of the authentic Christian community: assiduous attention to the teaching of the Apostles (that is, we have to learn how to live as Christians); communion, the union of hearts manifested also in the sharing of goods; the Eucharist; and prayer. We are challenged to examine ourselves constantly, to see how our Catholic communities parallel the description of the ideal community in the Acts of the Apostles.

The more perfect community is possible by faith, as St. John reminded us in the second reading [1 Jn 5:1-6]. So that allows us to look at St. Thomas in a different way. There is a tendency to see his doubt as something negative, a lack of faith or of trust of his fellow Apostles. However, we can also insert a pause in his remarks. "We have seen the Lord" [Jn 20:25]. It is not incredible to imagine Thomas saying, "And...?" After all, they were still locked in the Upper Room. What had changed? Eight days later, what had they done with their experience? Where had they taken the gift of the Lord's forgiveness? They were still afraid to move outside.

We must always ask that question. God's Mercy and His presence are incredibly generous, but what are the results for us?

We have prayed — "And...?"

We have walked in a procession — "And...?"

We have made our pilgrimage — "And...?"

We have made clear our opposition to abortion — to unjust laws — to capital punishment — to the mistreatment of the poor — "And...?"

Walking with Christ

The Easter mystery which we celebrate for 50 days requires us to grow in His presence and to make His victory over sin

> and death ours. That is a constant in our walking with Christ. ...

Pope Francis takes up the theme in his reflection at the conclusion of the Year of Mercy:

Forgiveness is the most visible sign of the Father's love, which Jesus sought to reveal by his entire life. Every page of the Gospel is marked by this imperative of a love that loves to the point of forgiveness. Even at the last moment

of his earthly life, as he was being nailed to the cross, Jesus spoke words of forgiveness: "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do" (Lk 23:34).

We pray also for the grace to imitate that spirit of forgiveness and tolerance. That contribution will reduce tension, that tension that fills our world.

Saint Faustina holds out a promise to us, as she relates the Lord's words to us in her Diary: "Souls who spread the honor of My mercy I shield through their entire life as a tender mother her infant, and at the hour of death I will not be a Judge for them, but the Merciful Savior" (Diary, 1075).

Dear sisters and brothers, the long "Easter Day" will conclude this evening with Vespers. Twenty-four hours are insufficient to contain the Easter joy or to revel in the Easter mystery. ... We are filled with the grace of belief, but also challenged by the blessing of having life in the Name of Christ. That life requires our cooperation to make its fruit manifest.

It requires the courage of the day after.

SAINT MICHAEL AND THE CHOIRS OF ANGELS

have a friend who refuses to talk about anything having to do with Satan, even in the most abstract way. When his name comes up, she either changes the subject or bows out of the conversation. Clearly, it makes her uncomfortable.

I think many of us are like that. We'd rather not think about the devil, preferring instead to focus on more pleasant things. Granted, we should not dwell on Satan and his evil ways, because when we do that, we make him feel more powerful than he deserves. On the other hand, we should not ignore his existence, power to tempt us to disobey God's commandments, or ability to engage us in a spiritual battle.

We need to strike a balance between keeping our faces toward the divine and being aware of the influence of the evil one.

Resist evil

We are called by our Baptism to renounce evil and follow Christ. The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us, "By his reason, man recognizes the voice of God which urges him to 'do what is good and avoid what is evil.' Everyone is obliged to follow this law, which makes itself heard in the conscience and is fulfilled in the love of God and of neighbor" (1706).

Resisting temptation and sin isn't just a good idea; it's an obligation, part of our Christian mission, and gives us dignity.

Saints and angels

Thankfully, we're not left to our own devices in this regard! Our Lord has given us the Sacraments, particularly Reconciliation and Eucharist, to strengthen us against temptation. He's also given us heavenly helpers — the saints to intercede for us and the angels to protect and guide us. The saints are human beings who have gone before us and lived lives worthy of canonization and imitation.

But angels are pure spirits without forms or bodies whose only purpose is to praise God and mediate between God and man. They have the power of thinking, willing, choosing, and deliberately loving. Saints communicate to us through their words and examples while angels communicate with



us by suggesting things to our imagination, which we often call "inspiration." In their spiritual form, we cannot see them but they can make themselves look like anything they want by manipulating our imagination or putting on a disguise usually a human form; the images we see of angels with wings and halos are merely symbolic representations.

God acts through His helpers to form a spiritual shield around us to safeguard us from temptation and the nasty tricks and snares of Satan and his demons. They help us to resist the sins that could damage our souls and threaten our salvation.

Saint Michael

Among the saints and angels, St. Michael holds a prominent position in the fight against Satan and our protection against his wiles. When Lucifer, filled with pride and contempt, rebelled against God, it was St. Michael who cast him forever from the eternal gates.

Saint Faustina had a special place in her heart for St. Michael. On September 29, 1936 — the Feast of St. Michael — St. Faustina was visited by St. Michael, who assured her of his special protection against evil. He told her, "The Lord has ordered me to take special care of you" (*Diary of Saint* Maria Faustina Kowalska, 706).

A powerful, yet lesser-known devotion is the Chaplet of St. Michael. The chaplet was given by St. Michael himself to a Portuguese Carmelite nun, Antónia d'Astónaco, in 1751. He instructed her how to pray it, and to teach others about it, as well.

He made three promises to all who faithfully pray the Chaplet in his honor: an escort of nine angels chosen from each of the nine choirs of angels when approaching Holy Communion; his continual assistance and that of all the angels throughout life; and, after death, deliverance from Purgatory for themselves and all their relations.

The first time I prayed the Chaplet, I felt a great sense of peace and security. It was as if St. Michael had suddenly drawn very close to me and was reassuring me of his presence and protection. I began reciting the Chaplet of St. Michael as

> part of my morning prayer routine and since then I have rarely missed a day; it's part of my stable of essential devotions.

In practicing this devotion to St. Michael, I've received an additional and unexpected gift. I've not only grown closer to St. Michael, but also to the nine choirs, or groups, of angels traditionally recognized by the Church. The Chaplet includes nine

salutations (like decades of the Rosary), each addressed to one of the choirs, and each asking for a particular grace.

I pray that you discover the peace and security that I have in the Chaplet of St. Michael, and that you will introduce it to others as well. Together, we can stand strong against sin, temptation, and the influence of evil, and grow in holiness and wisdom. May St. Michael guide and protect you always!

The year 2025 will mark the 75th anniversary of the groundbreaking for the National Shrine, and the 65th anniversary of its dedication and blessing. In the April-

June 1960 edition of Marian Helpers Bulletin (the precursor of Marian Helper), Fr. Joseph shared his excitement at the opening:

The growth of the spiritual structure of Divine Mercy in America is, indeed, a marvel of God's grace. It is a sign that its origin is Divine, for no human work could move so far by its own accord. The change and progress appear unbelievable. The Shrine, once a small side chapel, is now an imposing edifice visible for miles around, standing proudly on the heights of Eden Hill overlooking the majestic hills and valleys of the Berkshire mountains,

calling all of God's children to imbibe and refresh themselves, in the peace and tranquility of God's Holy Love, uniting themselves with the Marian spirit on the heights with Our Lady of Eden Hill.

Sixty-five years. Think of it! Tens of thousands of pilgrims visit every year, so that means at least 2 million people have experienced in person this spiritual oasis, seeking to draw closer to the Divine Mercy Himself by means of prayer and the Sacraments. That doesn't include those who visit the Shrine daily online for Mass, the Chaplet, and the Rosary via our livestreams — numbering in the hundreds of thousands!

Truly, our National Shrine constructed in part by the Marian Fathers and brothers themselves is the jewel of Eden Hill. But like any grand individual of advancing years, it needs sprucing up.

Improvements

 - Exterior improvements: repair the front steps to the National Shrine; improve the plaza out front; and enhance the landscaping around the building.

If, by God's grace, we exceed our goal, every dollar above and beyond our needs for the National Shrine will be used to make physical improvements to Eden Hill for the benefit of our pilgrims and Marian Fathers.

Safe and sacred

We know that many of our pilgrims come here to Eden Hill in spiritual crisis. We know that many come to pray for loved ones or simply to give thanks for the presence of God in their lives. Many graces are received here, including physical and spiritual healings.

We owe it to our pilgrims — and to God Himself, who has entrusted us with this mission of spreading Divine Mercy — to provide a safe and sacred experience. The projects we have identified will go a long way toward achieving those ends, honoring the extraordinary 65-year legacy of the National Shrine.

HERE, **TAKE** MY HEART'

THE WONDER OF THE EUCHARIST

remember the moment like it was yesterday: my first Mass as a Catholic priest, when I would consecrate the ▲ bread and wine into the Holy Eucharist — the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ.

It was 15 years ago, on Pentecost Sunday, May 31, 2009, in my home parish, St. John Neumann in Gaithersburg, Maryland (coincidentally the home parish of our newest Marian priest, Fr. Stephen Castellano, MIC). I was ordained to the priesthood the day before by Bishop Martin Holley. Now it was time to celebrate Mass by myself.


The church was packed. But at the consecration, I was surrounded by a hush, like the quiet sweetness of a steady wind.

I remember the power of the words I spoke, slowly. It was all suddenly made real. Of course, I was already a believer, thanks in large part to my parish, one of the first in the Archdiocese of Washington, D.C., to establish perpetual Eucharistic Adoration.

Holding our Lord

But now it was strikingly different. I felt the reality, looking in awe like a child at the Host that has become the Body and Blood of our Lord. I could see through the outward appearance of bread and wine that I was holding the Lord in my hands.

It brought me back to my pre-ordination retreat at Mother Angelica's shrine in Hanceville, Alabama, and the story of how she was inspired to build her monastery by the statue (above) of the Divino Niño — the Divine Child — in Colombia. The Infant Jesus is holding out His Sacred Heart, and there's a cavity in His chest where His Heart should be. I felt the Lord very deeply touching my heart, as if to say,

"This is a picture of what your priesthood is called to be."

And so at the consecration I am holding the Heart of God. I'm called to place my heart here with His Heart, and give His Heart to the people.

In a word, wow. Yes, it was very emotional. And I can honestly say that, every day since for 15 years, whenever I celebrate Mass, the same feeling of awe and reverence and humility overcomes me. It has never, and will never, grow old. How could it possibly?

Eucharistic Revival

That is why it pains me, and my brother priests, to hear about the lack of reverence for the Eucharist, and the lack of understanding about the Real Presence. A feeling of sadness

comes over me. If people only knew Who they were missing!

It has been a blessing for me to be part of the National Eucharistic Revival under way throughout the United States. This could not happen at a more pivotal time in our history!

The Eucharist is the "source and summit" of our Catholic faith (see Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1324-1327). It's

the very heart, a place of encounter where Jesus is waiting for us, over and over again. It's reassuring to see people discovering that more and more, eager to deepen their relationship with Him.

As one of 50 "official" Eucharistic preachers, I talk about how we need to see through the eyes of children, who see the wonder and marvel in things that the rest of the adult world takes for granted, or finds boring. It's about helping people re-discover Jesus. He's right here. He comes in a quiet whisper that has its own thunder beneath it.

walked or drove by a Catholic church, you blessed yourself, and men tipped their hats. Why? Out of respect for Jesus, waiting inside.

He died for us

One of my favorite novels is *Les Miserables* by Victor Hugo — pretty good musical and movie, too. My favor-

> ite scene (and a favorite of Fr. Mike Schmitz) is very Eucharistic, when Jean Valjean rescues Marius. He's willing to go the extra mile, dragging him to safety through the muck of the sewers of Paris. He could have simply left him and swum to safety himself. But no.

And the Passion is like that. At any moment, Jesus could have said, "I'm outta here." But no. He loved us to the end. He emptied Himself all the way to the bottom to drag us out of sin. He sacrificed Himself so we can be free.

That's the reality of the Eucharist. It's the mystery of the Cross at every Mass, and Jesus is present. Behold the Lamb of God! He's reaching down, pulling us out of the muck and mire of our sins so that we can be saved.

In our noisy existence, there's still this quiet, gentle whisper. It's Jesus, saying, "Look here, because that's where your heart is going to finally rest. It won't rest anywhere else."

Jesus is waiting

Jesus is waiting for you, at every Mass. He wants you here. He's opening His Heart. He's saying, "I thirst for you." Pope Francis talks about the "merciful gaze" of Jesus. He knows you, and sees you.

From the Cross, Jesus is looking at me with love and He's saying, in a sense, "Yes, you have crucified Me by your sins. But I've come to make all things new." And so it's like the Child saying again, "Here's My Heart. Will you take it?"

If you haven't picked up the habit yet, please try Eucharistic Adoration. Adoration is the place where Jesus trains us how to see like a child. But beware: from a modern standpoint, Adoration is the most boring, pointless thing ever. You're just sitting there! Our minds are wired to scream against silence.

The feeling is normal. Just take a few moments to turn back the years, put away the phone, clear your mind. Wade through that noisy storm, to experience something far deeper on the other side. God is present before you in the Eucharist. He is listening. Talk to Him.

If you can't make it to an Adoration chapel, just go to any Catholic church. Jesus is right there, in the tabernacle, waiting for you.

Readers of a certain age will recall that whenever you

THE EUCHARIST AND DIVINE MERCY

Few people know more about the Holy Eucharist than Vinny Flynn, life-long Marian Helper and former Marian Press executive editor. Vinny sets approved private revelation alongside Public Revelation in his book Mercy's Gaze: 100 Readings from Scripture and the Diary of St. Faustina, a perfect devotional for either Eucharistic Adoration or praying before the <u>Divine Mercy Image</u>. Marian Helper sat down with Vinny to find out what connects these two devotions.

What can the Divine Mercy Image teach us during this National Eucharistic Revival? I'm tempted to call it kind of the cheat sheet.

It's even more than a cheat sheet. It's a full outline to a renewed appreciation of the Eucharist!

You see, everything in the <u>Divine Mercy devotions</u> — Feast, Image, Novena, Chaplet, Hour (FINCH) — centers on the Eucharist. They all draw their grace from the Eucharist — as do the other Sacraments of course — but especially the Divine Mercy Image.

We're supposed to be gazing on the Image to convert our hearts, the Catechism of the Catholic Church says, looking on Christ to convert our hearts (see 2715, 2724). Pope St.

John Paul II is saying, "Contemplate the face of Jesus" (Novo Millenio *Ineunte*). We're contemplating it there in the Image.

That's supposed to lead us to realize that that's what we should be doing with the Eucharist. We are contemplating the Face of Jesus in the Eucharist and we're doing it with Our Lady, whom St. John Paul calls the Woman of the Eucharist. We ask Our Lady to help us in the Eucharist to contemplate who's really there.

Is it rather like looking into a mirror?

Exactly. This is the God of Mercy in person. This is Divine Mercy in person. And just as Fr. Kosicki used to say, we're not supposed to just hang that

Image on the wall; we're supposed to become it. We're supposed to look at that Image enough so that it's like we're looking in the mirror.

When I look in the mirror, do I see a hand raised in blessing? Do I see another hand inviting people into my heart? Am I pouring love, mercy, and forgiveness upon all the people who are coming to me?

So we're supposed to look at the Image so that we can conform ourselves to it, become like God, which is the same thing that the Eucharist is for. We're not supposed to just consume the Eucharist. We're supposed to allow it to become us, and us to become Eucharistic in our lives.

Eucharistic spirituality: Become what you eat, and enter into communion.

Saint Faustina put it beautifully, saying the Lord was alive in her heart between the physical acts of communion. Is

that really the point for all of us?

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Absolutely. She talks about the indwelling: "Once after Holy Communion, I heard these words: You are Our dwelling place." (Diary of Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, 451). Note that: You are *Our* dwelling place. And she continues: "At that moment, I felt in my soul the presence of the Holy Trinity, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit." My soul is in communion with these three.

Recall the verse from John 14:23: "Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them."

That's the indwelling of God. So we see St. Faustina sharing that she's experiencing this presence of the Trinity. And

> then we have in Scripture St. John telling us, "This is real. Christ told us that the Trinity makes its dwelling in us."

That is one of the great strengths of your book, Mercy's Gaze: You allow Scripture and the Diary to shed light on each other, to unpack each other.

I loved doing this, going through and selecting certain Scriptures and selecting certain passages from the Diary to bring out what seemed to be the strongest themes in both. And then to see how closely the Scriptures and the *Diary* are in presenting the same message, the same — if you will, the same Revelation from the Lord.


The Holy Spirit never contradicts Himself. That's not surprising, but it's certainly edifying to see that, especially useful for people who are wondering, "Well, who is this? Who is this Polish nun? How does she know all this stuff? And where is this stuff coming from? How do I know this is real?" You find it all in Scripture. There's nothing new here. It's just a different focus. It's a concentration.

As kids, we used to take a magnifying glass and shine it on a certain point on a leaf with the sun focused so it gets more intense, and actually start a fire with it.

Well, that, to me, is what God's trying to do. He started to set our hearts on fire. "Let's take the Gospel message. Now, let's focus it all so you can see it through the lens of mercy. You understand what My plan really is. Here now, let Me take hold of you and set you on fire."

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Two Champions of the Eucharist

ne was born in the 1800s, and died an old man of heart disease, a year or so into the pontificate of St. John Paul II. The other was born in 1991, and died as a teenager, barely a year into the pontificate of Pope Benedict XVI, suffering from acute leukemia.

One authored many books, appeared on television in its earliest days in award-winning shows and historic appearances, and pioneered televangelism, never seeing the rise of the internet.

The other took to the internet to spread the word of Eucharistic miracles, Marian apparitions, and the reality of Heaven, hell, and Purgatory.

They are Venerable Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen (1895-1979) and Blessed Carlo Acutis (1991-2006).

Two halves, same coin

Blessed Carlo and Ven. Sheen are two halves of a coin, two Christians doing the same work — spreading the word of the

Gospel to an unbelieving modern world, and doing it using the very latest in technology, of which they were each early adopters.

These two children of God, with such different lives, different upbringings, and different lengths of time on earth to make their marks, are perhaps some of the foremost apostles of the Eucharist in the last 150 years.

Ordained to the priesthood for the diocese of Peoria, Illinois, in 1919, Ven. Sheen is best remembered for his unprecedented 40-year run on radio and television, hosting "The Catholic Hour" (1930-50), "Life is Worth Living" (1952-57), and "The Fulton Sheen Program" (1961-68).

A gifted theologian with an engaging style, Ven. Sheen won

an Emmy Award in 1952 for "Outstanding Television Personality." In his acceptance speech, he said, "I feel it is time I pay tribute to my four writers — Matthew, Mark, Luke and John."

Venerable Sheen, who was appointed bishop of Rochester, New York, and titular archbishop of Newport, Wales, practiced the daily Holy Hour, a practice that may have saved his humility and his soul — few Catholics of any description can both endure that level of celebrity and still be saints. He was also a preacher at the 1976 Eucharistic Congress,

a unique event in American Catholic history for having also been attended by then-Cardinal Karol Wojtyla (the future St. John Paul II); Mother (now Saint) Teresa; and Servant of God Dorothy Day.

"It is so easy to lose Christ; He can even be lost by a little heedlessness; a little want of watchfulness and the Divine Presence slips away," Ven. Sheen said. "But sometimes a reconciliation is sweeter than an unbroken friendship. There are

two ways of knowing how good God is: one is never to lose Him; the other is to lose Him and find him again."

Pokemon and computers

Born in London, Bl. Carlo soon moved with his family back to Assisi, Italy. A popular, funny kid who loved video games, computers, but above all else, God and neighbor, Carlo touched many, many souls during his short earthly life.

"He loved football, Pokémon, action films, and all animals (he had four dogs, two cats and many goldfish as pets)," said Corinna Turner in *The Catholic Herald*. "From early childhood, his first love was Our Lord in the Eucharist. Neither of his parents were religious, yet from an early age Carlo never wanted to pass a church without going in to 'say hello to Jesus.' As a result, his mother came back to faith, then his father."


Blessed Carlo designed and created "The Eucharistic Miracles of the World," an international exhibit that tours the world and has a website dedicated to it, as well as several other websites dedicated to sharing the word of God's miracles. What Bl. Carlo began, the Holy See has adopted and expanded.

Blessed Carlo is one of the most quotable of holy millennials. "The Eucharist is my highway to Heaven," he said. "To always be close to Jesus: that's my life plan." And this: "Everyone is born an original, but many die as a photocopy."

When he was stricken with leukemia, this astonishing teenager proclaimed, "I'm happy to die because I've lived my life without wasting even a minute of it doing things that wouldn't have pleased God." Amazing!

Venerable Sheen and Bl. Carlo are both inspirations for us, young and old, in this time of Eucharistic Revival, when the New Evangelization is more badly needed than ever, and the times are as dark as ever.

The two are truly different, but also rooted in the same

reality, the same love of the Eucharistic Lord, the same devotion to the Good News of Jesus Christ, the same fidelity to the faith and morals teaching of the Church, the same abiding willingness to stand on the side of Christ and His Church, even through suffering, scandal, or tumultuous times.

They are the bookends of a time of immense change in the Church, and now we turn to them both for their interces-

sion and help in these times of ours, when the ideologies of the last 300 years all seem to be back, all seem to be coming for a reckoning, all seem to be waiting for the Mother of God to deal with them, since she promised us, "In the end, my Immaculate Heart will triumph. The Holy Father will consecrate Russia to me, and she shall be converted, and a period of peace will be granted to the world."

Follow them

They are bookends, Archbishop Sheen and Carlo Acutis. God willing, through their work the faith of many more will emerge.

The writings, videos, and recordings of Ven. Sheen continue to touch hearts and minds, continue to change lives.

The websites established by Bl. Carlo have been taken over by the Holy See, and expanded, and continue to proclaim the miracles of God across the history of the Church, miracles to provide evidence to the modern world that God is in His Heaven, and the Catholic faith is true.

Follow Ven. Sheen and Bl. Carlo to the Eucharistic Lord, and bring your neighbors with you. That way, we shall have a true Eucharistic Revival, and change the world.


On Divine Mercy Sunday, the cause for canonization of Niña Ruiz-Abad was officially opened at the Cathedral of St. William the Hermit in Laoag City, Philippines. Venerable Niña received the title of "Servant of God."

Devotion to the Eucharist

Born Oct. 31, 1979, in Quezon City, to lawyer parents, Niña lost her father when she was 3. Her mother was a great devotee of Divine Mercy, and Niña took after her, having a strong devotion to the Eucharist. From her early years, she distributed Rosaries, Bibles, and other religious articles to her neighbors and schoolmates.

Diagnosed at the age of 10 with the heart condition that would ultimately kill her, Niña was a model of redemptive and joyful Christian suffering. She died in 1993, just 13 years old, making her

one of the youngest people to ever have a cause for canonization opened for them.



SUFFERING WITH JOY

Father Dennis Ruíz, postulator of the cause, compared Niña to Bl. Carlo.

"Many of the youth nowadays are preoccupied by technology, fashion, fun, pleasure and desire for worldly material things, which sometimes draw their attention away from healthy relationships, especially to God," he said. "With the presence of dysfunctional families and family disintegration in today's society, children are usually the most affected, which consequently makes them turn for solace and consolation to their environment.

"But having a good model of piety and fortitude for the youth, they can be saved from utter destruction. Knowing Niña's character and traits and her strong faith toward God will serve as a guide to the youth."

"Today, children and young people are inspired by the life of Niña Ruiz-Abad to live a life rooted in prayer," the Philippine Bishops' Conference stated. "Her story continues to reach the hearts of many

people because it is an example of how, with God, obstacles can be overcome."



THE CHURCH'S RESPONSE

uring this time of war and unrest, now into the third year of war between Ukraine and Russia, I get asked all the time: Has the Catholic Church ever officially condemned fascism, nationalism, and Marxism?

She certainly has, and for a long time. Look back 90 years to a series of encyclicals by Pope Pius XI in which he addressed all three subjects.

On June 29, 1931, responding to the alarming rise of a totalitarian fascist regime in Italy, the Holy Father published Non Abbiamo Bisogno ("We Do Not Need"):

A conception of the State which makes the rising generations belong to it entirely, without any exception, from the tenderest years up to adult life, cannot be reconciled by a Catholic either with Catholic doctrine or with the natural rights of the family. It is not possible for a Catholic to accept the claim that the Church and the Pope must limit themselves to the external practices of religion (such as Mass and

the Sacraments), and that all the rest of education belongs to the State (52).

Response to Hitler

The encyclical Mit Brennender Sorge ("With Burning Anxiety") was published on Palm Sunday, March 14, 1937, in response to Hitler's regime in Germany and the alarming rise in anti-Semitism. Distributed in secrecy, it was read from the pulpit of every Catholic church in the country:


Whoever exalts race, or the people, or the State, or a particular form of State, or the depositories of power, or any other fundamental value of the human community — however necessary and honorable be their function in worldly things — whoever raises these notions above their standard value and divinizes them to an idolatrous level, distorts and perverts an order of the world planned and created by God; he is far from the true faith in God and from the concept of life which that faith upholds. ... None but superficial minds could

stumble into concepts of a national God, of a national religion; or attempt to lock within the frontiers of a single people, within the narrow limits of a single race, God ... (Isaiah 40:15). (8, 11)

Turning his attention to Spain, Mexico, the Soviet Union, and atheistic communism, Pius XI issued another encyclical

> one week later: <u>Divini Redemptoris</u> ("The *Promise of a Divine Redeemer"):*

Both man and civil society derive their origin from the Creator, Who has mutually ordained them one to the other. ... The Creator Himself has regulated this mutual relationship in its fundamental lines, and it is by an unjust usurpation that Communism arrogates to itself the right to enforce, in place of the divine law based on the immutable principles of truth and charity, a partisan political program which derives from the arbitrary human will and is replete with hate (33).



Firm 'Yes'


Clearly, the answer to the question is a firm yes, and all three encyclicals should be required reading. They are available at Vatican.va.

The Catholic Church may not express it often enough, but the position is clear. The Catechism of the Catholic Church, moreover, is unequivocal:

Moral judgment must condemn the plague of totalitarian states which systematically falsify the truth, exercise political control of opinion through the media, manipulate defendants and witnesses at public trials, and imagine that they secure their tyranny by strangling and repressing everything they consider "thought crimes" (2499).

f her surname sounds familiar, it should, from your schooldays: She was the daughter of the great American writer Nathaniel Hawthorne (1804-1864), Lauthor of *The Scarlet Letter, The House of the Seven Gables*, and other classics. And she was born just a few miles from the National Shrine of The Divine Mercy in Stockbridge, Massachusetts.

Rose Hawthorne's story is at once unique and relatable. She was a Catholic convert; the separated wife of an alcoholic, who died a few years after they'd parted ways; a model of the works of mercy through the work of the Hawthorne Dominicans in serving the poor suffering from cancer.

"Many Catholics are unfamiliar with the life and influence of Rose Hawthorne," according to the Rose Hawthorne Guild, "and yet there is scarcely one who could not identify with Rose."

Stockbridge-Lenox roots

The famous writer and his family lived in a red "cottage" on the border of present-day Stockbridge and Lenox from August 1850 to November 1851. Rose was born on May 20, 1851, the third and last child of Hawthorne and Sophia Peabody.

The original cottage burned down in 1890, but a "re-creation" of it sits behind the world-famous Tanglewood concert venue.

Growing up traveling Europe, living a remarkably privileged life by the standards of the time, Rose was first exposed to Catholicism in the course of her travels, even seeing Pope Bl. Pius IX during Holy Week. She would later write, "I became eloquent about the Pope, and was rewarded by a gift from my mother of a little medallion of him and a gold scudo [coin] with an excellent likeness thereon, both always tenderly reverenced by me."

Both parents died when Rose was in her teens.

In 1871, age 20, Rose married George Parsons Lathrop, the editor of *Atlantic* Monthly, and they had one child, Francis. Sadly, he died at the age of 4.

Conversions

In 1891, while living in New London, Connecticut, both George and Rose converted to Catholicism. "To many of their old friends this conversion came as a shock; but to Rose and George it was grace filled," according to the Rose Hawthorne Guild. "In their new lives as Catholics, George and Rose attempted to devote themselves to work for the Church."

But a happy ending was not to be. George slid into alcoholism, which made his behavior more and more erratic till the couple separated with the permission of the Church. He died in 1898.

At age 45, Rose decided to dedicate herself to one of the works of mercy, so she studied nursing at New York Cancer Hospital. "A fire was then lighted in my heart, where it still burns," she wrote. "I set my whole being to endeavor to bring consolation to the cancerous poor." Working on the lower east side of Manhattan, Rose attracted companions to join her in her labors.

"While this work took up a great portion of her strength and time, she records in her diary daily Mass attendance, frequent confession, the recitation of litanies and novenas, and spiritual direction," notes the Rose Hawthorne Guild.

Cancer victims

Inspired by a young Dominican priest, Rose became a third-order Dominican and, taking the name Mary Alphonsa, went on to found the Hawthorne Dominicans, dedicated

to caring for the destitute enduring cancer, which was then seen as a contagious, dangerous disease. On Dec. 8, 1900, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, Archbishop Michael Corrigan of New York approved the new community of Dominican Sisters.

Under Mother Mary Alphonsa's leadership, the Congregation expanded its good works to several care homes. She carried on with her heroic work till her death in 1926, at the age of 75, at her motherhouse in Hawthorne, New

> York. She was declared Venerable by Pope Francis on March 14, 2024.

Mother Mary Alphonsa died the same year that the Marian "Renovator," Bl. George Matulaitis made his tour of America, but two decades before the Marians arrived in Stockbridge. She was ministering to the poor in New York City at the same time as Mother Frances Cabrini, recently in the limelight in the Angel Studios movie Cabrini (and who had a much harder time with Archbishop Corrigan).

Mother is also a distant cousin of the actor Mark Wahlberg (Father Stu) and his brother, producer/ director Jim Wahlberg, who

spoke at the National Shrine of The Divine Mercy this past Divine Mercy Weekend.



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GIVING ALL TO MARY

ot many religious sisters have experienced the joys of falling in love, getting married, and raising a family. However, I had the pleasure of hearing from one who has.

"Sister Rose" (name changed for privacy purposes) never expected to hear a call to the religious life, and even less the call to a cloistered life. But like our Marian Fathers, Sister shares a profound devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and credits much of her call to enter the religious life to Our

After her husband's death in 2018, and shortly after her children left home for college, Sr. Rose felt called to do something meaningful with her time after work. With the help of Our Lady, she found herself enlisting in the Legion of Mary and joining the Secular Order of the Discalced Carmelites (OCDS).

Sister Rose would spend her weekends going door to door evangelizing, visiting the convalescent homes or praying in front of the local abortion center. Her connections in the Legion of Mary led her to her local parish, where she eventually signed up as a nightly adorer. On every first Friday and Saturday, she would finish her work as a designer at a high-tech company, head straight to Eucharistic Adoration, and not leave until after Mass the next morning.

"I was there so much that Father could have charged me rent!" she laughs.

Keep trying

During the countless hours she spent in Adoration, Sr. Rose specifically remembers praying for an end to abortion and for her

vocation. Her spiritual director encouraged Sister to reach out to different convents in hopes of fitting in somewhere as a "late" vocation.

Patience and perseverance were required. Sister either didn't get a response or was beyond the age limit. She wanted to give up, but her spiritual director encouraged her to keep trying.

She continued her search. Her prayers were answered

during a "Come-and-See" weekend retreat at a convent that was coincidentally hosting a Fatima pilgrimage. The prioress and chapter took it as a sign of the beginning of her vocation.

"I felt as though Our Lady was at my back, guiding my every step," Sister recalls. "How loved and blessed I was to have Our Lady so close."

> Sister Rose had finally found her home, in a cloistered convent in middle America. "God has poured His grace out upon me, and this is a blessing beyond belief."

Vow of poverty

A condition on entering religious life is to relinquish all of your material

goods, honoring the vow of poverty. Accordingly, before entering the convent, Sr. Rose gave all of her savings to the Marian Fathers and other missionary organizations in thanksgiving to Our Lady for her intercession for

her vocation. Her donation is now a Donor Advised Fund, so it will continue to assist the Marian

Fathers and their mission.

"I lovingly support the Marian Fathers with what I have been given," Sr. Rose says. "I praise God and thank Him for allowing me to participate financially in spreading His Word and His apostolic work for the glory of the Kingdom of Heaven."

Sister Rose asks only one small thing in return: "Please pray for me to persevere in my vocation."

We certainly will, Sr. Rose!

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hen <u>Fr. Donald Calloway, MIC</u>, attended the red-carpet Hollywood premiere of *Jesus Thirsts*: The Miracle of the Eucharist, the new Jim Wahlberg-produced documentary in which he and Fr. Chris Alar, MIC, make an appearance, it brought back memories of another gala premiere, 36 years ago.

On April 19, 1988, *Divine Mercy — No Escape* had its East Coast premiere at Radio City Music Hall in New York City. "America's First Lady of the Theater," Helen Hayes, who narrated the film, was in attendance, as well as actress Melanie Metcalf, who played Sr. Faustina.

"The world of stage and screen ordinarily have little to do with the world of cross and consecration. In American culture they usually stand opposed to each other," wrote Fr. Gerald Ornowski, MIC (pictured above with Helen Hayes), in the summer 1988 edition of Marian Helpers Bulletin. This was not the case with Divine Mercy — No Escape. "Not only has the genius of modern cinematography been put at the service of a religious message, but the people of religion and the theater have had to relate. Both seem to have come away for the better.""

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
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
